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President's Message



Chinook

In 2012, Chinook was finally able to work more on projects, with the addition of Georgina Souter as Rural Branch Manager. Georgina has been working on a pilot program to help materials move more efficiently between branches. When block rotations stopped and Chinook moved to floating collections, the hope was that patron holds would provide enough variety in the branches as material moved between branches to fill these requests. This is happening to some extent, but it has been a slower process than hoped—one reason for this is that a request can be filled by a book from anywhere in the province, so there has not been the amount of new material arriving and remaining in branches as anticipated. Also, many rural patrons have been slow to adapt to the new system and do not always place holds or ask their librarians to request items for them. So in some cases new books leave the region after processing to fill holds in another region. These do come back, but in the meanwhile that new material is unavailable to Chinook patrons. For the pilot program

Georgina has linked several branches who are exchanging material with each other with help from Headquarters. If this project is successful it will hopefully expand through the region.

Georgina is working on reviving the branch newsletter. She will also be sending branches news and information on new books arriving at Headquarters to increase awareness of what is available. The intention is to increase a patron's ability to use not just Chinook's resources but those of the entire province more effectively. Outcomes of this project should be more new books and other resources moving between branches and improved circulation throughout the region.

Chinook is also planning to weed dated materials from branches to make it easier for patrons to look through the shelves and make collections more up to date.

Lakeland

Lakeland has welcomed a new Librarian to their staff. Eleanor Crumblehulme arrived on November 5th from Vancouver and was welcomed by a blanket of snow. Eleanor takes on the position of Regional Librarian formerly held by Cassandra Mireau who has moved to another region. Eleanor is fitting in very well.

2012 saw a small increase in overall stats, a substantial increase in eservice use, and an increase in active patrons of 16.32%. Lakeland added more items to their system than in previous years and did a good job of removing an even larger number of old material from the system.

Lakeland's book budget was spent without the usual panic at yearend. January saw Lakeland with a new budget, including an increase in materials larger than in past years. Lakeland's budget includes all the obvious material selections but a small amount has been provided to put preloaded ereaders in the rural areas of the region. A trial Lakeland will be eagerly watching.

Parkland



Staff attended the *Mother Goose on the Loose* workshop in Regina on October 22, 2012. Two people



have been hired to run programs at Yorkton Public Library. The funding comes from the Family Space Grant that Yorkton Public Library received earlier in the year.

The Director started working at and out of Yorkton Public Library on December 22, 2012 due to the resignation of the Chief Librarian and other staff shortages.

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PNLS

In October, PNLS held another successful Northern Library Conference. The theme was taken from the Cultural Day: Many Faces, Many Stories.

Becky Szeman gave a Social Networking workshop for the PNLS Executive Committee. Facebook was identified as the first priority—search PNLS on Facebook. Be sure to visit the new page!

In November, PNLS tried an experiment in delivering a workshop to member library

boards. While participation was disappointing it was worth trying and finding out that a different way to hold a workshop is needed.

PNLS has recruited people for two positions—Office Manager and Library Consultant. Susan Folkersen is the new Office Manager. Shaun Mason, who received his MLIS from McGill University, started work as Library Consultant.

With training new people, member library Annual General Meetings, finishing yearend, doing annual reports, working with auditors and trying to confirm a solid budget for 2013 the staff at headquarters are busier than ever.

Regina Public Library

RPL, along with Mayor Fougere, introduced Read Together Regina on January 28—an early literacy program designed by RPL to raise awareness about the importance of developing early literacy skills in children. The program provides every baby born at the Regina General Hospital with a book bag containing early literacy resources and books. In addition, parents can visit any RPL location to get a Library card for their baby and a free Read Together Regina bib.

RPL joined the Twitter world in October, 2012. Follow @officialRPL.

In January, RPL partnered with CBC to bring Regina residents the Human Library. CBC provided 20 "human books" at Central Library for registered patrons to meet and discuss experiences with people they normally would not chat with.

RPL continues to share its expertise on the NCSF executive team, facility design team, and the integration and communications committees. A contest is being held to find a name for the facility.

RPL introduced technological innovations (MERLON) in several Branches to help improve the library experience of low vision patrons.

RPL has also renewed its relationship with RSO to provide patrons with six free concerts at Central Library.

Families were invited to their favorite

RPL location for cookies and juice on Family Literacy Day.

In 2013 both Albert Branch and Prince of Wales Branch will celebrate 100 year anniversaries.

The Books 4 Me offers patrons an opportunity to have RPL librarians find their next great read. Patrons answer a few quick questions about their reading preferences and RPL puts together a personalized book list that is delivered straight to their inbox. It's been very successful.

Saskatoon Public Library

2013 marks the 100th anniversary of SPL. Throughout the year a number of initiatives and special programming has been planned. To learn more check the centennial page at saskatoonlibrary.ca/spl100years.

The SPL Foundation held its inaugural meeting on June 20, 2012. Work is underway drafting terms of reference.

The 2nd annual Word On The Street Saskatoon was held September 23. The event drew over 4,500 people with a free outdoor book and periodicals fair held in the Civic Square and at the Frances Morrison Library. Planning is underway for the 2013 festival—September 22/13.

Renovations are underway in Fine &

Performing Arts at the Frances Morrison Library. The placement of a new combined reference/circulation desk in Fine Arts will create a small patron seating area.

The annual Friends of the Library annual fundraiser Dance Party at the Hat was a huge success raising over \$7,000.

Gwen Thomson, Manager of Adult & Information Services, Frances Morrison Library retired December 31, 2012.

SPL participated in the Festival of Trees Once Upon a Storytime. Approximately 600 people enjoyed the live storytelling throughout the week.

As there have been instances where

material containing bed bugs has been returned to the library, SPL is working proactively towards a long-term strategy for dealing with bed bugs.

In December 2012 SPL announced the launch of a Leisure Collection Partnership with the U of S Library. The partnership is called SPL on Campus. By providing an enhanced leisure service to University Library clients, SPL is providing an important outreach service which could increase actual use of other resources of the SPL.

Wapiti

Wapiti Regional Library has been engaged in a series of meetings with representatives from the John M. Cuelenaere Library.

The Wapiti Strategic Planning session, held last spring, was facilitated by Flo Frank, who did an excellent job over one day and had Wapiti ready the next day to present the plan to the entire Regional Board at the Annual General meeting. This has resulted in focusing Executive and senior management energy on ten major recommendations to be incorporated into a three year Work Plan timeline.

The top recommendations were:
i. To increase and improve communication;

- ii. Develop a public relations strategy;
- iii. Adapt with technology;
- iv. Develop a training plan;
- v. Improve access to quality library services.

Other recommendations include building relationships, increase membership, evaluation framework, increase funding and revenue generation, and maintain an effective Executive committee.

Wapiti has engaged a Youth Intern under the CAP program to assist in IT, eBooks, social media and digitizing forms.

Wheatland

In the fall, Wheatland toured all 46 branches. It was a chance to visit one-on-one with librarians, as well as a chance to see all branches. This tour also allowed Wheatland to make informed decisions for future planning.

Wheatland has completed their part of the "Finding Health Information Online for Seniors". Four branches - Osler, Hague, Dalmeny, and Aberdeen - completed sessions in November. From all reports, this program was very well received, and Wheatland has had

requests for more sessions. For this program, Wheatland partnered with SPL, Public Health Services (Older Adult Wellness and Public Health Observatory of the Saskatoon Health Region), Saskatoon Housing Authority, and the Saskatoon Health Region Medical Library. The project has funding from the Saskatoon Heath Region through the Community Health Grant.

For Aboriginal Storytelling month, four branches, in partnership with their local schools, will host award winning Native American flute player Jason Chamakese and Aboriginal drummer Robert Gladue. Rosetown, Eston, Lucky Lake, and Kyle will have performances on February 11th and 12th.

Wheatland's Governance Committee is currently working on revising policies to correspond with their recently updated bylaw document.

Provincial Library

Evaluation and future planning for Summer Literacy Camps continues.

The Literacy and Lifelong Learning Committee met in October, 2012. The Government and Public Libraries Forum Early Learning Committee will meet in February, 2013.

The Multilingual Library Services
Committee met in Saskatoon in
November, 2012, with three Saskatoon
based immigrant services agencies and
the SPL to discuss potential
collaborations to better serve

The Library Services for Saskatchewan Aboriginal Peoples Inc. will be celebrating the 10th year Anniversary of the Saskatchewan Aboriginal Storytelling Project. The official launch will be held on February 4, 2013, at the

Royal Saskatchewan Museum in Regina.

The PLLO distributed the 2012 Aboriginal Library Services grant report template to the 10 library systems. The template is designed to gather outcomes and ascertain the impact the grant of \$289,876 has had on the public libraries, First Nations and Métis people and the province as a whole.

The Multitype Unit has completed the 2012-13 product license renewals and the new editions/volumes of the Gale Virtual Reference Library eBooks have been added. The Multitype Unit continued to arrange trials for products of interest to partner libraries. Preparations for the 2013 AGM in April are underway. The Saskatchewan Multitype Digitization Initiative has been rebranded as Saskatchewan History Online (SHO http://saskhistoryonline.ca). The SHO

launch event was October 16, 2012 at the University of Saskatchewan. SHO provides single-search access to a wealth of Saskatchewan's historical and cultural record and will continue to grow.

Ms. Julie Arie has joined PLLO to conduct a review of Saskatchewan multitype library programs.

The Multitype Unit is arranging a preconference training workshop at the 2013 SLA for MDLP databases.

A new 3-year Provincial Public Library Plan has been in development following consultations with Board Chairs and library Directors. A draft plan is being finalized and will be shared with Boards and Directors, with a view to publishing the plan after the May Board Chairs and Directors meeting.

Minister' Brief Update

Your executive had the SLTA annual meeting with Minister Russ Marchuk on December 19th. It was a very cordial meeting during which the following points were made:

- Libraries are a powerful and essential resource for the people of Saskatchewan to empower every citizen.
- Libraries have changed. They are resource centres where staff provide advice, resources, mentorship, support and motivation to patrons of all ages.
- Libraries need substantial resources to move into the 21st century. Resources of technology but more important by staff and volunteers.
- Libraries are an essential resources to our education system.

These are some of the main points. The main message was that Saskatchewan Libraries need significant Provincial funding beyond the below sustenance funding they have received over

the last years.

As is understood, the Minister listened but could not make any commitment prior to the release of the Provincial budget.

The Provincial budget will tell Library supporters throughout the Province whether or not our legislators are listening and valuing the important contribution libraries are and can make to the future of Saskatchewan.
